COVID-19

COVID-19 Impact on Mental Health

- Rapid increase in individuals experiencing mental health symptoms for the first time
 - Normal grief and stress turning into prolonged grief and major depression
 - Symptoms of PTSD
- Those with mental health conditions see their symptoms worsen
 - Youth age 11-17 have been more likely than any other age group to score for moderate to severe symptoms of anxiety and depression.
 - 40% of those responding to a CDC survey indicated they were experiencing at least one adverse mental or behavioral health symptom

Crisis Diversion Centers | Rural Crisis Care | Stepping Up Initiative

Reduce

Reduce hospital emergency department admissions and jail bookings due to behavioral health crisis.

Promote

Promote integrated services, regardless of diagnosis (mental health, substance use disorder or co-occurring intellectual disability)

Decrease

Decrease the rates of referral to expensive and restrictive inpatient care with extended lengths of stay.



Core Components of the Diversion Center

- 24/7/365 Access, Assessment, Linkage
- Temporary Observation (23 hours)
- Extended Observation (<7 days)
- Collaboration with specialty providers
 - Intellectual/Developmental Disability, Deaf Services, Substance Use Disorder





Request: One New Crisis Diversion Center Located in Region 2

- Five Community Mental Health Centers (CMHCs) are currently eligible to respond to the agency's RFP
- Respondents must be able to:
 - Score high enough to demonstrate capacity to stand up a Crisis Diversion Center
 - Incorporate a regional approach



Request: \$2.5 million for 5 existing programs


- Continuation funding for 5 programs funded through FY21 supplemental appropriation

Request: Three New Crisis Homes

- One (1) four-bed crisis respite home
- Two (2) three-bed crisis homes for individuals with an intellectual disability and co-occurring behavioral health issue
- Reliable studies indicate that 33-40% of individuals with intellectual disabilities have a co-occurring behavioral health issue
- Current incident management data indicates there are 230-300 behavioral related episodes that could be addressed through enhanced behavioral services

Request: Provide specialized mental health services to decrease the number of co-occurring high utilizers

- Individuals with co-occurring disorders are persons who have one or more mental disorders, *but do not meet the criteria for serious mental illness or a serious emotional disturbance*, and have one or more substance use disorders
- Examples of conditions that may not meet the criteria for 'serious' mental illness
 - Mild to moderate depression
 - Moderate to severe anxiety


Stepping Up Alabama Initiative

\$1.8 million
General Fund**

Request: Fund remaining 28 counties to complete statewide implementation

- Stepping Up provides case management services to individuals in jails and hospital emergency departments
- Stepping Up is a ground-up approach engaging local communities to identify needs
- Alabama is one of five states working to expand statewide


FY21 Update: Tiered Services

The Best Investment in Prevention and Early Intervention

- 50% of mental illness begins by age 14 and 75% by age 24
- Evidence-based practice in collaboration with the Alabama State Department of Education (ALSDE)
- ADMH provides Tier 3 services in partnership with community mental health centers
- ALSDE provides Tier 2 services in partnership with local education agencies (LEAs)
- ADMH is producing 10 training modules to certify ALSDE Mental Health Service Coordinators.
 - ADMH has offered the modules virtually since December 2020



Request: Add 15 new LEAs to School-Based Mental Health Collaborative

- Partner with ALSDE to provide resources and training to address COVID-19 impact on student and teacher mental health

The Human Infrastructure Crisis (Workforce)

Stability in staffing over time is the cornerstone of treatment consistency and therapeutic relationships

- Alabama is last in the nation in the ratio of behavioral healthcare workforce to citizens (1:1200)
- Alabama ranks 50th in behavioral health workforce availability
- People with an intellectual disability (ID) rely on Direct Service Providers (DSP) for daily support that enables them to live in our communities
- Unfortunately, finding, keeping and training this workforce has reached crisis levels:
 - Average annual DSP turnover rates of 45 percent (range 18-76%)
 - National average DSP wages of \$10.72 per hour which is below the federal poverty level for a family of four
 - Half of DSPs rely on government-funded and means-tested benefits
 - Most DSPs work two or three jobs

Stabilizing Human Infrastructure (Workforce)

- **SA Services** – 6% residential and 3% outpatient services (\$2.27M GF)
- **MH Services** – 6% residential and 3% outpatient services (\$6.69M GF)
- **DD Services** – 6% residential and 8.7% all other waiver services (\$6.31M GF)
 - Nurse Delegation Program – \$4 a day to \$8 a day (\$1.2M ETF)
 - DD Services combined total \$7.52M

Implementation of Home and Community-based Settings Rule

- Due to COVID-19, the HCBS deadline was extended from March 2022 to March 2023
- ADMH and AMA agreed to proceed with the compliance work
- Accomplishments:
 - Deconflicted case management
 - Advocacy and Education www.hcbsalabama.org
 - Validation, monitoring and reporting complete
 - Remediation/transition plans are approved for all but 10 waiver settings

New Waiver Program

- The new waiver is called the Community Waiver Program (CWP)
- Due to federal administration changes, CMS postponed the waiver effective date from February 1 to March 1, 2021


Developmental Disabilities
FY21 Update

- The new waiver program will begin in a pilot phase with services offered in 11 counties

There are five enrollment groups:

1. Children (ages 3-13) with intellectual disabilities who live with family or other natural supports
2. Transition-age youth with intellectual disabilities who (ages 14-22) live with family or other natural supports or who live independently (ages 18-22)
3. Working age or older adults (ages 23+) with intellectual disabilities who live with family or other natural supports or who live independently
4. Persons (ages 3+) with intellectual disabilities who are unable to live with family or other natural supports or to live independently
5. Individuals with ID, ages 22 and older, who have a minimum of one substantial functional limitation

Developmental Disabilities Community Waiver Program



11 Pilot Counties: Baldwin, Elmore, Houston, Jefferson, Limestone, Madison, Mobile, Montgomery, Morgan, Tuscaloosa, and Walker

- New Community Program Waiver will serve 500 individuals in first year
- This will reduce the waiting list by 25%
- 46% of the individuals on the current waiting list reside in six counties:
 - Baldwin, Jefferson, Madison, Mobile, Montgomery, and Tuscaloosa
